Our Betjeman Circle logo is one of Martin's sketches for his now famous statue at St. Pancras Station. John Betjeman was Trust secretary from 1946 to 1948.

OPT Annual Report, 1927.

The OPT planning L team have been busy reviewing two more applications on sites around the edge of the city which will deliver over



1,750 dwellings. There are 64 allocated sites of various sizes in the Oxford Plan and now the City are looking beyond to 2040. These housing and other pressures are not going to go away and what we must do is try to make sure that the Oxford we get is one that everyone can still enjoy. We will be thinking about this as we grapple with the Oxford Flood Alleviation Scheme which has once again reared its head and which will spoil some of OPTs much loved and much used green spaces if it goes ahead.

Broad Street...

The committee has been looking at the trial plans for **Broad Street**. It's not right yet but having started in 2004 and given an award to Broad Meadow in 2021 we are keen to help make it happen. *Watch this space...*


her successor. Their experience and expertise in heritage and charity administration will be enormously helpful. I'm delighted to say that Debbie has also offered to provide her full support to the process.
